INTERNSHIP

D. Pharm program consist of certificate course of satisfactorily completion of internship as referred in RGPV Ordinance 29. Training is carried out in a Retail Pharmacy or Hospital. Certificate is provided after completion.

D. Pharm students have to complete their internship programme of 750 hours and get a certificate

with a report to complete their Diploma program.

As a trainee they are trained under a registered pharmacist and gets practical experience in: -

- a. Reading, understanding, translating and copying the prescription including checking of the
- b. The dispensing of prescriptions illustration the commoner methods of administrating medicaments and
- c. Storage of drugs and medical preparations.

After the completion of the internship they submit a report with a certificate from the organization they are entitled to receive the practical training as required in the Education Regulations framed under Section 10 of The Pharmacy Act, 1948.

Every candidate shall undergo practice school for a period of one month or 150 hours evenly distributed throughout the semester.

Assessment is conducted on basis of a viva conducted by an external examiner and the report submitted.

PROJECT WORK

It is mandatory program for final year B.Pharm. students. Faculties mentor students to undertake a project on any Pharmaceutical related topic. As per curriculum, 12 hours per week is assigned for completion and submission of project work. Assessment is conducted on basis of a viva conducted by an external examiner and the report is submitted. Carries 150 marks weightage. They get a- hands on training on:

- Research methodology and techniques.
- Conducting literature review.
- · Out of box thinking for students.

BIOSTATISTICS

In M. Pharm. hands on training on research methodologies. The curriculum carries 400 marks for research work compiling and submitting the thesis. The external examiner conducts viva and marks are awarded.

TWO YEARS DIPLOMA PROGRAMMES 4.0

Rajiv Gandhi Proudyogiki Vishwavidyalaya, Bhopal awards first Diploma in the discipline of Rajiv Gandni Floudyogini Vishtwavidyalaya, Bilopal awards has Diploma in the discipline of Pharmacy as approved by All India Council of Technical Education (AICTE), New Delhi and Pharmacy council of India of two-years duration, hereinafter called 2-YDP, shall be designated as DIPLOMA IN PHARMACY. The studies and examinations of this Diploma programmes shall be on the basis of year system.

RULES FOR ADMISSIONS

The minimum qualification for admission to the first year of the Diploma programme in Pharmacy (Admission BASED ON STATE LEVEL MERIT) shall be the passing of 12th class or higher examination under (10+2) education scheme with Physics, Chemistry and Biology by obtaining minimum 60% marks collectively in that, conducted by M.P. Board of Secondary Education or an equivalent examination from a recognized Board/University. Candidates for above programmes shall be admitted to the Colleges/Institutions by preparing a Merit List based on the percentage of total marks obtained in Physics, Chemistry and Biology in qualifying examination. SC/ST and OBC candidates are not required to obtain minimum 60% marks.

In general, admissions/Readmission to all Diploma Programmes shall be governed by the rules framed by D.T.E. from time to time or any other competent authority of the State Government of Madhya Pradesh/RGPV.

RULES FOR MAXIMUM DURATION OF THE PROGRAMME 3.0

There shall be normally 180 days of teaching in every year.

A candidate may provisionally continue his/her studies in higher classes after the 3.2 examinations of the previous year are over. However, his/her eligibility shall be evaluated only after the result of examination is declared in which he/she had appeared.

The maximum duration for passing all the courses (theory, practicals and Industrial Training) of the programme shall be FOUR years for 2 years Diploma Programmes, no separate time will given to students for medical or any reason 3.3 whatsoever. Candidates debarred from examination due to UFM cases or any other reason will also have to clear their Diploma programme in the duration mentioned above. Names of those candidates, who are unable to clear their Diploma programme in the stipulated period will be struck off from the roll list of the college and enrolment of the University.

RULES FOR PASSING EXAMINATIONS

7.1 BASIS OF MARKS

- The basis of marks obtained in each examination shall be the Scheme of examination of courses for individual years as prescribed by respective Board of Studies and duly approved by Academic Council of
- For the evaluation of End of the year exam in Practicals, one external examiner shall always be there from outside the College/Institution and one internal examiner from the College/Institution.
- In the schemes of Diploma programmes, where flexibility has been provided to students for selection of courses, once a student in a particular group of electives has made the choice of elective course, it cannot be changed for future study/examination.



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- A candidate who wishes to improve sessional marks can do so by appearing in (b) two additional sessional examination during the next Academic year. Average score of these two examination shall be, basis for improved sessional marks in theory.
- The sessional of practicals shall be improved by appearing in two additional (c) practical examinations in next academic year. Average score of these two examination shall be, basic for improved sessional marks in practical.
- There shall be no sessional improvement in, any day to day assessment in (d) practical of the subject, unless he takes regular admission.
- Provided further that request to improve the sessional shall be entertained only (e) once that too in next academic year but not in subsequent year.
- After appearing for sessional improvement test, student will have to appear in theory paper as well, of the said subject, in subsequent main / supplementary examination, since theory marks (of the subject) obtained in earlier examination will not be carried forward, after appearing for improvement test.

AWARD OF CERTIFICATE OF DIPLOMA IN PHARMACY

A Certificate of Diploma in Pharmacy shall be granted to a successful candidate on producing certificate of having passed the Diploma in Pharmacy Part-I and Part-II and satisfactory completion of practical training for Diploma in Pharmacy (Part-III).

RULES FOR IMPROVEMENT OF DIVISION IN FINAL DIPLOMA

- If a candidate has passed all the semester examination in full he/she shall be permitted to reappear in that examination for improvement in division provided the candidates makes an application within two months from the date of passing/declaration of result of the said programme. Candidates will be allowed to appear as an ex-student in all the theory of final year except Industrial training of the respective Diploma programme. In case of change in curriculum, candidate will be allowed to improve division in the old curriculum, till the University of is conducting examination of old curriculum.
- 152 Re-valuation and Re-totaling is not allowed in the cases of improvement in division.

Programme

(For the candidates admitted in 1st year on and after July 2017)
(Under Grading System applicable on and after July 2017)

1.0 GENERAL

The Bachelor of Pharmacy (B.Pharm.) shall be a four years (eight semesters)degree programme, and three years (six semesters) degree programme for lateral entry students.

2.0 ADMISSION

The Admission to B.Pharm. degree programme shall take place on the basis of 2.1 and 2.2 as given below and/or Gazette notification issued by Government of Madhya Pradesh from time to time.

2.1 First year B. Pharm:

Candidate shall have passed 10+2 examination conducted by the respective state/central government authorities recognized as equivalent to 10+2 examination by the Association of Indian Universities (AIU) with English as one of the subjects and Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics (P.C.M) and /or Biology (P.C.B / P.C.M.B.) as optional subjects individually.

2.2. B. Pharm lateral entry (to third semester):

A pass in D. Pharm. course from an institution approved by the \\Pharmacy Council of India under section 12 of the Pharmacy Act.

3.0 STRUCTURE OF BACHELOR OF PHARMACY (B.PHARM.) PROGRAM

- 3.1 There shall be at least 100 days of teaching in every semester.
- 3.2 The curriculum and syllabi of the course shall be notified by the University from time to time.

3.3 Course Description: Course description shall consists of:

- i. Course Code
- ii. Title of the Course
- iii. Credits in the form of L-T-P
- iv. Course Objective, its Outcome and References
- v. Pre-requisites, co-requisites if any,
- vi. Svllabi
- vii. Reference books, if any
- 3.4 The medium of instruction and examination shall be English throughout the course of study. But a student can opt for Hindi provided that the option for medium of instruction and examination be made at the starting of program and shall remain Hindi

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throughout the program, A student shall not be allowed to change the medium of instruction and examination during the course.

4.0 ATTENDANCE REQUIREMENTS

- 4.1 All students must attend every lecture, tutorial and practical class. However, to account for late registration, sickness or other such contingencies, the attendance requirement will be a minimum of 80 % of the classes. Condonation shall be as per the examination general Ordinance Number 12. He can be condoned to 10% and a further 5% by the principal of the college and Vice-Chancellor of the University, respectively for satisfactory reasons.
- 4.2 Attendance record will be maintained based upon roll calls(or any equivalent operation) in every scheduled lecture, tutorial and practical class. The course coordinator will maintain and consolidate attendance record for the course(lectures, tutorials and practical(s) together, as applicable). Head of the Institute shall be responsible for maintaining the attendance records for the courses run by the institute.

5.0 EXAMINATIONS

5.1 There will be one University Examination at the end of each semester. These examinations will be designated as follows:

(a) During First Year

First Semester B.Pharm. Examination, Second Semester B.Pharm. Examination

(b) During Second Year

Third semester B.Pharm. Examination, Fourth semester B.Pharm. Examination

(c) During Third Year

Fifth semester B.Pharm. Examination, Sixth semester B.Pharm. Examination

(d) During fourth Year

Seventh semester B.Pharm. Examination, Eighth semester B.Pharm. Examination

- 5.2 The semester examination will generally be held in Nov.-Dec. and May- June in each year.
- **5.3** At the end of every semester, a letter grade is awarded in each course.

Project Work :

All the students shall undertake a project under the supervision of a teacher and submit a report. The area of the project shall directly relate any one of the elective subject opted by the student in semester VIII. The project shall be carried out in group not exceeding 5 in number. The project report shall be submitted in triplicate (typed & bound copy not less than 25 pages).

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The internal and external examiner shall evaluate the project at the time of the Practical examinations of other semester(s). Students shall be evaluated in groups for four hours (i.e., about half an hour for a group of five students).

8,8 Industrial Training (Desirable):

Every candidate shall be required to work for at least 150 hours spread over four weeks in a Pharmaceutical Industry/Hospital after the Semester – VI and before the commencement of Semester – VII. It includes Production unit, Quality Control department, Quality Assurance department, Analytical laboratory, Chemical manufacturing unit, Pharmaceutical R&D, Hospital (Clinical Pharmacy), Clinical Research Organization, Community Pharmacy, etc. The student shall submit a typed and bounded report of such work and certificate duly signed by the authority of training organization to the head of the institute.

5.6 .Practice School:

In the VII semester, every candidate shall undergo practice school for a period of 150 hours evenly distributed throughout the semester. The student shall opt any one of the domains for practice school declared by the programme committee from time to time.

At the end of the practice school, every student shall submit a printed report (in triplicate) on the practice school he/she attended (not more than 25 pages). Along with the examinations of semester VII. The report submitted by the student, knowledge and skills acquired by the student through practice school shall be evaluated by the subject experts at college Leveland grade point shall be awarded.

Educational Study Tour(Desirable):

For B. Pharm. Sixth semester students, an educational study tour to visit important manufacturing organizations is desirable. All students will submit a typed and bounded tour report after the study tour duly signed by faculty in charge(s).

- 5.8 The practical examination will be conducted respectively on course basis by internal and duly appointed external examiner.
- 5.9 A student shall be continuously evaluated for his / her academic performance in a subject through tutorial work, practical, home assignment, internal assignment, field work, seminars, quizzes, endsemester examinations etc. regularly, as proposed by respective Board of Studies from time to time.

5.10 Promotion and award of grades

A student shall be declared PASS and eligible for getting grade in a course of B.Pharm. programme if he/she secures at least 50% marks in that particular course including internal assessment. For example, to be declared as PASS and to get grade, the student has to secure a minimum of 50 marks for the total of 100 including continuous mode assessment and end semester theory examination. Similarly the





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student has to secure a minimum of 25 marks for the total 50 including internal assessment and end semester practical examination.

5.11. Carry forward of marks

In case a student fails to secure the minimum 50% in any Theory or Practical course as specified in 5.10, then he/she shall reappear for the end semester examination of that course. However his/her marks of the Internal Assessment shall be carried over and he/she shall be entitled for grade obtained by him/her on passing.

5.12.Improvement of internal assessment

A student shall have the opportunity to improve his/her performance only once in the Sessional examination component of the internal assessment. The re-conduct of the Sessional examination shall be completed before the commencement of next end semester theory examinations.

5.13 Re-examination of end semester examinations

Re-examination of end semester examination shall be conducted as per the schedule notified by the university from time to time.

5.14. Academic Progression

No student shall be admitted to any examination unless he/she fulfills the norms given in 4.1.

Academic progression rules are applicable as follows:

A student shall be eligible to carry forward all the courses of I, II and III semesters till the IV semester examinations. However, he/she shall not be eligible to attend the courses of V semester until all the courses of I and II semesters are successfully completed.

A student shall be eligible to carry forward all the courses of III, IV and V semesters till the VI semester examinations. However, he/she shall not be eligible to attend the courses of VII semester until all the courses of I, II, III and IV semesters are successfully completed.

A student shall be eligible to carry forward all the courses of V, VI and VII semesters till the VIII semester examinations. However, he/she shall not be eligible to get the course completion certificate until all the courses of I, II, III, IV, V and VI semesters are successfully completed.

A student shall be eligible to get his/her CGPA upon successful completion of the courses of I to VIII semesters within the stipulated time period as per the norms specified in 11.

A lateral entry student shall be eligible to carry forward all the courses of III, IV and V semesters till the VI semester examinations. However, he/she shall not be eligible to attend the courses of VII semester until all the courses of III and IV semesters are successfully completed.

A lateral entry student shall be eligible to carry forward all the courses of V, VI and VII semesters till the VIII semester examinations. However, he/she shall not be eligible to get the course completion certificate until all the courses of III, IV, V and VI semesters are successfully completed.

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A lateral entry student shall be eligible to get his/her CGPA upon successful completion of the courses of III to VIII semesters within the stipulated time period as per the norms specified in 8.

Any student who has given more than 4 chances for successful completion of I / III semester courses and more than 3 chances for successful completion of II / IV semester courses shall be permitted to attend V / VII semester classes ONLY during the subsequent academic year as the case may be. In simpler terms there shall NOT be any ODD BATCH for any semester.

Note: Grade AB should be considered as failed and treated as one head for deciding academic progression. Such rules are also applicable for those students who fail to register for examination(s) of any course in any semester.

6 AWARD OF GRADES

6.1 Sessional Examination:

Two Sessional examinations shall be conducted for each theory / practical course as per the schedule fixed by the college(s). The scheme of question paper for theory and practical Sessional examinations is given below. The preparation of Sessional Question paper will be responsibility of respective college(s). The average marks of two Sessional examinations shall be computed for internal assessment as per the requirements.

Sessional examination shall be conducted for 30 marks for theory and shall be computed for 15 marks. Similarly, Sessional examination for practical shall be conducted for 40 marks and shall be computed for 10 marks.

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7 CONDONATION OF DEFICIENCY

- Deficiency up to five marks can be condoned in any two of the subject (theory or practical) to the best of the advantage of the student for passing the examinations. The deficiency can be condoned in not more than two subjects (theory and practical of the same subject shall be considered as two separate subjects, for the purpose of awarding grace).
- 7.2 The candidate whose distinction or first division is affected by 0.01 of CGPA shall be eligible for Condonation of 0.01 CGPA on behalf of the Vice-Chancellor for which the candidate has to apply separately.

8. DURATION FOR COMPLETION OF THE PROGRAM OF STUDY

The duration for the completion of the program shall be fixed as double the actual duration of the program and the students have to pass within the said period.

9. RE-ADMISSION AFTER BREAK OF STUDY

Candidate who seeks re-admission to the program after break of study has to get the approval from the university by paying a condonation

No condonation is allowed for the candidate who has more than 2 years of break up period and he/she has to rejoin the program by paying the required fees.

Ordinance of Master of Pharmacy Two Years Post Graduate Degree Course

(For the Candidates admitted in 1st year on and after July, 2021) (Under Credit Based Semester System applicable from July, 2021. (Approved on 22 July, 2021)

1. Short Title and Commencement:

These regulations shall be called as "The Revised Regulations for the Master of Pharmacy (M. Pharm.) Degree Program - "Credit Based Semester System (CBSS)". They shall come into effect from the Academic Year 2021-22. The regulations framed are subject to modifications from time to time by the authorities of the university.

2. Minimum qualification for Admission:

- 2.1 Candidate should pass in B. Pharm. Degree examination of an Indian university established by law in India from an institution approved by Pharmacy Council of India and has scored not less than 55 % of the maximum marks (aggregate of 4 years of B. Pharm.). Candidates belonging to SC/ST categories will get relaxation as per the norms of State Government of Madhya Pradesh.
- 2.2. Applicants possessing valid GPAT score shall be given preference over to those candidates who do not possess GPAT score.
- 2.3 The admissions to M. Pharm. course shall be governed by the rules of the Technical Education and Skill Development Department, Government of Madhya Pradesh, Bhopal and/or any other competent authority authorized by the State government of Madhya Pradesh for this purpose.
- 2.4 Every student, selected for admission to post graduate pharmacy program should have obtained registration with the State Pharmacy Council or should obtain the same within one month from the date of his/her admission, failing which the admission of the candidate shall be cancelled.

Note: It is mandatory to submit a migration certificate obtained from the respective university where the candidate had passed his/her qualifying degree (B. Pharm.)

3. Duration of the program:

The program of study for M. Pharm. shall extend over a period of four semesters (two academic years).



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4. Medium of instruction and examinations:

Medium of instruction and examination shall be in English.

Working days in each semester shall consist of not less than 100 working days. The odd semesters shall be conducted from the month of June/July to November/December and the even semesters shall be conducted from the month of December/January to June / July in every calendar year.

5. Attendance and progress:

A candidate is required to put in at least 80 % attendance in individual courses considering theory and practical separately. The candidate shall complete the prescribed course satisfactorily to be eligible to appear for the respective examinations.

6. Program/Course credit structure:

As per the philosophy of Credit Based Semester System, certain quantum of academic work viz. theory classes, practical classes, seminars, assignments, etc. are measured in terms of credits. On satisfactory completion of the courses, a candidate earns credits. The amount of credit associated with a course is dependent upon the number of hours of instruction per week in that course. Similarly, the credit associated with any of the other academic, co/extra-curricular activities is dependent upon the quantum of work expected to be put in for each of these activities per week/per activity.

6.1 Credit assignment:

- 6.1.1 Theory and Laboratory courses are broadly classified as Theory and Practical. Theory courses consist of lecture (L) and Practical (P) courses consist of hours spent in the laboratory. Credits (C) for a course is dependent on the number of hours of instruction per week in that course, and is obtained by using a multiplier of one (1) for lecture and a multiplier of half (1/2) for practical (laboratory) hours. Thus, for example, a theory course having four lectures per week throughout the semester carries a credit of 4. Similarly, a practical having four laboratory hours per week throughout semester carries a credit of 2.
- 6.1.2 The contact hours of seminars, assignments and research work shall be treated as that of practical courses for the purpose of calculating credits. i.e., the contact hours shall be multiplied by 1/2. Similarly, the contact hours of journal club, research work presentations and discussions with the supervisor shall be considered as theory course and multiplied by 1.

7. Minimum credit requirements:







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The minimum credit points required for the award of M. Pharm. degree is 95. However, based on the credit points earned by the students under the head of co-curricular activities, a student shall earn a maximum of 100 credit points. These credits are divided into Theory courses, Practical, Seminars, Assignments, Research work, Discussions with the supervisor, Journal club and Co-Curricular activities over the duration of four semesters. The credits are distributed semesterwise. Courses generally progress in sequence, building competencies and their positioning indicates certain academic maturity on the part of the learners. Learners are expected to follow the semester-wise schedule of courses given in the syllabus.

8. Examinations/Assessments

8.1 End Semester Examinations: The End Semester Examinations for each theory and practical course through semesters I to IV shall be conducted by the university except for the subject with asterix symbol (*) in table I and II for which examinations shall be conducted by the subject experts at college level and the marks/grades shall be submitted to the university

8.2 Internal assessment: Continuous mode:

The marks allocated for Continuous mode of Internal Assessment shall be awarded as per the scheme given below.

17. Declaration of class:

The class shall be awarded on the basis of CGPA as follows:

First class with distinction: CGPA of. 7.50 and above

First class: CGPA of. 6.00 to 7.49

Second class: CGPA of. 5.00 to 5.99.

18 Project work:

All the students shall undertake a project under the supervision of a teacher in Semester III and IV and submit a report. One copy of the project report shall be submitted to University.

The external examiner appointed by the University shall evaluate the project at the time of the Practical examinations in consultation with internal.

19. Award of Ranks:

Ranks and Medals shall be awarded on the basis of final CGPA. However, candidates who fail in one or more courses during the M. Pharm program shall not be eligible for award of ranks. Moreover, the candidates should have completed the M. Pharm program in minimum prescribed number of years, (two years) for the award of Ranks.

20. Award of degree:

Candidates who fulfill the requirements mentioned above shall be eligible for award of degree during the ensuing convocation.

21. Duration for completion of the program of study:

The duration for the completion of the program shall be fixed as double the actual duration of the program and the students have to pass within the said period, otherwise they have to get fresh Registration.

22. Revaluation/Retotaling of answer papers:

As per the prevailing norm of University.

Condonation of Deficiency: One grace mark will be given to the candidate who is either failing a semester or missing distinction/ first division by one mark, on behalf of the Vice Chancellor in the M. Pharm. examination.







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23. Re-admission after break of study:

Candidate who seeks re-admission to the program after break of study has to get the approval from the university by paying a condonation fee. At any time of course a student can have a maximum break of two years only.
